Galle City Takes Strides Towards a Plastic-Free Future:

A Collaborative Effort

In a concerted effort to combat plastic pollution and promote environmental sustainability, the Ministry of Environment in Sri Lanka, in collaboration with the United Nations Environment Program – Basel, Rotterdam and Stockholm Conventions (UNEP - BRS), the Institute for Global Environmental Strategies (IGES), and HELP-O, has embarked on the ambitious project of making Galle City plastic waste-free.

A significant milestone in this endeavor was achieved recently, targeting the hotel sector. On January 10, 2024, an online training session was conducted, focusing on the installation of "Micro Plastic Filters" for washing plants. This crucial measure aims to minimize microplastic pollution, contributing to a cleaner and healthier environment. The training session was successfully completed at the Jetwing Lighthouse Hotel premises in Galle.









Leading the charge in this educational initiative were Mr. Jost from the United **Nations** Environment Program (UNEP -BRS), Dr. Premakumara from the Institute for Global Environmental Strategies (IGES), and Mr. Chatura Welivitiya, the CEO of HELP-O. Mr. Asoka Siriwardena, the Executive Director, played a pivotal role in facilitating the initiative. Dr. Andrej from the Planet Care Institute contributed generously his technical expertise the installation of "microplastic filters.



The active involvement of the management of the Galle Jetwing Lighthouse Hotel and Sunset Hotel is a testament to the commitment of the hotel sector in Galle towards addressing the pressing issue of waste. embracing plastic By sustainable practices. these establishments are setting an example for others to follow, showcasing the industry's dedication to environmental responsibility.

Transforming Waste into Opportunity: HELP-0 Launches Innovative Waste Management Project in Karapitiya Bombay Castle Settlement



Galle, in a groundbreaking initiative under the "collaborative action for clean city of Galle" waste management cooperation project, the HELP-O organization, with the generous financial support of the Clean Cities Blue Ocean Program under the USAID CCBO, has successfully implemented the distribution of indoor compost bins to 15 households in the Karapitiya Bombay Castle Settlement. The initiative, spearheaded by HELP-O Chief Executive Officer, Mr. Chathura Welivitiya, witnessed the active participation of other officials and a Community Development Officer of the Galle Municipal Council.

objective The primary this endeavor is to introduce the Japanese **BOKASHI** indoor composting system, a cutting-edge and efficient method for converting waste into kitchen compost. The chosen settlement. Karapitiya Bombay, is forefront of this waste management revolution, setting an example for other communities in Galle.

Mr. Chathura Welivitiya expressed his enthusiasm for the project, stating, "This initiative marks a significant step towards creating a cleaner more sustainable and environment in Galle. By introducing the BOKASHI composting system, we aim not only to manage organic waste effectively but also to lay the groundwork for future agriculture initiatives within the community."





The BOKASHI composting system, originating from Japan, accelerates the natural composting process by utilizing beneficial microorganisms. This not only reduces the volume of waste but also produces nutrient-rich compost that can be used to enhance soil fertility. The 15 households selected to receive the indoor compost bins are now equipped with a practical and sustainable solution to manage their kitchen waste.

Looking ahead, the project envisions the expansion of urban agriculture in the Karapitiya Bombay Castle. The introduction of homegrown produce not only fosters a sense community self-sufficiency but also contributes to а greener healthier environment. In addition, the initiative aims to establish a local market for non-biodegradable waste, including plastic, glass, and tin, fostering a circular economy within the settlement.

The financial backing from the Clean Cities Blue Ocean Program, through USAID CCBO, has played a pivotal role in making this project a reality. Their support underscores the commitment to sustainable waste management practices, aligning with the broader mission of creating clean and resilient cities.



As Galle continues its journey towards becoming a clean city, the success of this pilot project in Karapitiya Bombay Settlement serves as a testament to the positive impact that collaborative efforts, innovative solutions, and community engagement can have on waste management. The "Let's make Galle a clean city" initiative, with the HELP-O organization at forefront, is paving the way for a greener, cleaner, and more sustainable future for Galle and its residents.

USAID-CCBO PROGRAM PRESS RELEASE ON PROGRAM CLOSURE





Colombo, January 30, 2024 -Thanks to a nearly three-year partnership, supported by the American people through the United States Agency for International Development (USAID), communities across Lanka successfully prevented more than 4,600 metric tons of plastic - the equivalent of 496 million plastic bottles - from entering the ocean around Sri Lanka through the Clean Cities, Blue Ocean (CCBO) program.

The CCBO program, launched in Sri Lanka in 2021, is USAID's global flagship program to address ocean plastic pollution. In Sri Lanka, demand for single-use plastics has while waste management systems have struggled to keep pace with only an estimated 20 percent of households having access to public waste collection services. As densely а populated island nation, Sri Lanka faces unique challenges in managing its solid waste.

Through CCBO, the United States partnered with local organizations to design and pilot innovative, economically viable, and environmentally sustainable solutions address each step in the waste value chain. providing technical assistance and grants totaling more than US \$1.2 million (Rs. 382.8 million). of result these partnerships, an additional 625,000 Lankans benefitted from improved solid waste services. communities around Colombo. Galle. and Jaffna have adopted sustainable practices that promote increased reuse and transformation of waste products into new items.

"The United States is helping Sri Lanka improve management of its natural resources to build resilience and insulate the country from the harms of climate change," said Dennis Wesner, deputy director of Economic Growth for USAID Sri Lanka and Maldives.

"While CCBO is ending, our work will not stop. The United States will continue to work together with Sri Lankan counterparts to find locally viable solutions and reduce ocean plastics."

"We celebrate the collaborative efforts of Clean Cities, Blue Ocean Sri Lanka program that developed sustainable solutions reduce ocean plastic. As we confront the escalating crisis of ocean plastic pollution, CCBO has been an exemplary partner in progressing their commitment to extended producer responsibility. This initiative exemplifies commitment to environmental stewardship, showcasing the positive impact of strategic partnerships and community engagement on creating cleaner, healthier cities for our citizens," said Mr. Prabath Chandrakeerthi, Secretary, Ministry of Environment.

Globally CCBO's goal is to reduce the estimated 11 million metric tons of plastic that flow into the ocean worldwide each year by targeting rapidly urbanizing areas of countries, a major source of ocean plastic pollution.




Jiaqi Du
